Ishikawa's Unique Inns Farmhouse, Shrine and Temple Inns

Farmhouse Inns 1

Deep immersion in traditional Japanese lifestyle in Noto peninsula

40 farmhouse inns

There are 40 different farmhouse inns you can stay at in Shunran-no-Sato, but you can make reservations for all of them at the same place. Large groups can also be accommodated.

One party of guests per inn

All of the inns only accept one party of guests at a time, giving them exclusive access to the inn. It also allows the hosts to provide the best hospitality they can, making it feel more like staying at a relative's house than a hotel. For larger groups, you can eat meals with your entire group, and then retire to your individual host families afterwards to relax in your own inn.



Shunran-no-Sato

In the Noto Peninsula in the North of Ishikawa Prefecture, the bucolic Satoyama farmlands spread out between the mountains. The people here live off the bounty of the fields and mountains, and this traditional connection with nature is still reflected in their everyday lives. In the peaceful villages in the center of this rural landscape, there are 40 traditional farming houses which are now used as inns to host international guests. Here you can enjoy the hospitality of the locals and experience the truly unique charms of the Noto Peninsula.

Delicious homemade meals served on Wajima-nuri lacquerware

Enjoy lovingly-crafted homemade meals made from local ingredients and served on fine dishes of Wajima-nuri lacquerware, a local traditional craft.

Traditional Japanese houses with sunken hearths

Stay in traditional Japanese houses complete with sunken hearths, tatami mats, thick ceiling beams, and sliding doors.

Seasonal activities

In autumn you can try your hand at digging for sweet potatoes and then roasting them to make a delicious piping hot treat, or go hunting for mushrooms. There are different activities available in each season.

Shrine and Temple Inns : Step into the world of Buddhism or Shinto for a unique lodging experience

What are shrine/temple inns?

Shrine and temple inns are lodging facilities associated with a local shrine or temple, originally used to house pilgrims or visiting priests and monks, but in modern times they accept tourists as well. They have a lot of interesting features that make staying in them a unique experience.

Experience an authentic Zen tradition with over 700 years of history at a Sōtō-sect Buddhist temple:

Sōjiji-soin Temple Inn 2

At the historic Sōjiji-soin Temple, part of the ancient Sōtō-sect of Zen Buddhism, the spirit of Zen lives on to this day. On the temple grounds you'll find an inn where guests can experience a day in the life of the 20 or so monks in training who live and train here. Come experience an authentic Zen lifestyle on these temple grounds.



Features

Authentic Zen Ascetic Practice

There are multiple courses available: the Sanzen course, a course in which guests experience authentic Zen training, waking up around 4AM along with the monks in training to participate in Zazen (sitting meditation); as well as the Haishuku course, a more casual course in which guests can still participate in Zazen if they would like. All guests participate in the morning reading of scriptures in front of the Buddha, starting at 5AM.



Zazen and traditional vegetarian cooking

Experience authentic Zazen meditation in the same meditation hall the monks use for their everyday practice. All meals are made in accordance with Shōjin cuisine, the traditional vegetarian style of cooking made to accommodate Buddhist dietary restrictions. Enjoy delicious meals rich in vegetables, beans, and grains.



Meet an English-speaking monk from Germany

One of the monks in training is originally from Germany and speaks both English and German, so even guests who don't speak Japanese can participate and fully understand the Zen experience.

Features

Himatsuri

Guests can participate in Himatsuri, an ancient Japanese prayer ceremony performed to pray for protection from illness and disaster. Ikumo is the only place in Japan where one can participate in this ceremony, so it's a very rare and special experience.



Hand-copying Sutras and Meditation

During their stay at Ikumo, guests can try their hand at hand-copying Buddhist sutras or meditating, as they view the grand display of nature just outside the wide panoramic windows and enjoy the serene and calming atmosphere.

Breathtaking Scenery

Ikumo is located on a scenic mountain peak that offers panoramic views of the entire surrounding area, including Mt. Hakusan, the Sea of Japan, Kanazawa, and even as far as the Noto Peninsula. After waking up to the sounds of birdsong, you can watch the sun rise over Mt. Hakusan in the morning, and in the evening watch as the sun sets over the Sea of Japan.

An mountaintop inn surrounded by nature: Natadera Temple's Ikumo Lodge 3

On the peak of Mt. Engyo, located between the scenic Natadera Temple and Mt. Hakusan, one of the 3 Holy Mountains of Japan, you will find Ikumo, a scenic inn surrounded by bountiful nature as far as the eye can see. Come rest your body and mind in this serene place of healing.

Giant Kiriko lantern floats on display at the Wajima Kiriko Art Museum 5

Noto's traditional festivals feature large lantern floats which are paraded around town by the parishioners of the local shrine. At the Wajima Kiriko Art Museum, visitors can view over 30 different Kiriko of varying sizes. As the sound of festival drums and flutes play in the background, re-creating the atmosphere of the lively festival nights, visitors can experience what it's like to step into the energetic world of the Kiriko festivals.


